Replacement Road Levy Upcoming

The Plain Township Board of Trustees understands how important it is for township residents to be fully informed about their government, particularly when citizens are tasked with making decisions regarding the funding of their township services.

On November 7th, residents will have the opportunity to vote on a 1.5 mill replacement road levy with a 0.5 mill increase. For example, if a home was appraised by the county auditor to be valued at \$100,000, the proposed tax levy would cost the owner \$70 dollars per year or **\$5.83 per month.** The proposed road levy would be in effect for 5 years.



This levy contributes to road construction, reconstruction, and equipment replacement within the road department. No employee salaries are paid from this levy.

As the township with the second largest population in Stark County, the Plain Township Road Department provides comprehensive maintenance on over 175 miles of township roadway.

2018, and the cost to pave just one mile of roadway has risen by over 95%. This year, the cost to pave a mile of roadway reached an all-time high of \$165,000 dollars compared to only \$85,000 in 2018. Not only have resurfacing costs risen, so have daily construction costs. Culvert, block, brick, cement, signs, and pavement markings have all seen a dramatic increase in costs of over 40% in recent years.

Plain Township has also seen equipment costs nearly double. If sticker shock wasn't enough, the township is now waiting over two years for new vehicles to arrive. We continue to update our snow fleet, and our maintenance department works tirelessly to repair and keep our fleet moving. This task is increasingly difficult due to supply chain constraints. Just recently, our front-end loader was inoperable for over seven weeks as we waited for the parts to arrive.

Beyond keeping our roadways safe, our dedicated road department prides itself on completing resident work order requests. Already this year, our team has completed over 4,000 work orders. Our road department is also capable of large road repairs with our small paver and grinder. Although not equipped to pave entire roadways, we are able to repair soft/bad areas in roads. Being able to perform this work in-house has saved hundreds of thousands of dollars over the last 10 years. This is a service that many local communities are not capable of doing themselves and must contract this work out, usually at a higher cost.

Plain Township continues to grow with new developments and homes. As a result, new roadway miles continue to be added. With this growth comes an increasing demand for year-round maintenance of our roadways, as well as snow removal in the winter.

Unfortunately, due to the sky rocketing cost of road resurfacing, the former 10-12-year paving rotations have been extended out to a 17-20-year rotation. In 2021, our budget allowed us to pave 18.2 miles for \$1,685,542. This year, we are paving only 10 miles of road at a cost of \$1,860,117.00.

Over a two-year period, Plain Township has been forced to decrease the yearly paving mileage by over 8 miles per year. The cost of asphalt has increased over 65% since

Our roads help keep our property values up and allow safe well-maintained travel to and from work, school, and worship. We take pride in knowing that motorists know when they enter and exit Plain Township, because they are driving on top notch roads.

A Suitcase and a Whippet

We are always interested in the stories behind items that are donated. This suitcase belonged to Harry Alexander Wise (1885-1969). He was born in Plain Township, and later moved to Lake Cable being one of the first home owners there, also he worked for Mr. Cable. Harry even was an Auxilary Police Officer

at Lake Cable. His main employment was with the Ohio Power Company for 40 years. This suitcase, while small in size, traveled with Harry in his Whippet car.

Whippets were produced by the Willys-Overland Company from 1926-1931. The car was named for the famed racing dogs, and it became an immediate success due to its good looks, small size, speed and low price.



The Great Depression ended the production run for this model. Today, the only surviving part of the Willys-Overland Company is the Jeep which both Ford and Willy-Overland produced during World War II. Oh, the stories that suitcase could tell.

A Snapshot of History

As the Beach Boys put it in the song "I Get Around," 'None of the guys go steady 'cause it wouldn't be right to leave their best girl home on a Saturday night,' and cruising down Cleveland Avenue between 30th St NW and 44th St NW brought that local flair to Friday and Saturdays in Plain Township.

The Spotless Spot Drive-In was one of those destination from 1940-1954. This was a different type of dining experience when dining out and owning a car

was still a new idea. Pull your car up, someone comes out, takes your order, then brings your food to you and you eat in your car. This is when hot dogs and hamburgers were only 15 cents. What a great way to show off your ride as well. Following the Spotless Spot at their



location was the Waterloo Drive-In (1955-1960), King Steer Drive-in (1960-1961) and then Lujanís Burger Boy (1961-1976.) So, what was your favorite cruising spot and route?

H.B. 140 - Ballot Language Changes Began May 2023

On June 14, 2022, Governor Michael DeWine signed the Ballot Uniformity and Transparency Act (H.B. 140) into law, which became effective on November 13, 2022. Plain Township, like other local governments, typically receives funding from a variety of sources, including property taxes, which is a key source of funding for Plain Township operations and the services that Plain Township provides to its residents.

The county auditor in each of Ohio's 88 counties is the official charged with valuing every parcel of real property located within their respective county. Every property is assigned an appraised (market) value by the county auditor. All real property is then assessed for taxation at 35% of the appraised value; this 35% valuation is referred to as the assessed or taxable value of a property.

All property taxes are ultimately applied to individual properties at a certain property tax millage rate. One mill is one-thousandth of a dollar (one-tenth of a cent), and a one-mill tax equals \$1 in property tax levied per \$1,000 of a property's assessed value. Both unvoted and voted property taxes are applied to all properties in Ohio. Unvoted taxes, referred to as inside millage, are limited by state law to 10 mills of a property's assessed value and are divided among the overlapping local governments by statutory formula. Usually all or almost all of the unvoted 10 mills is levied on properties statewide. Voted taxes, referred to as outside millage, are levied at whatever millage rates are approved by a majority of voters of the local government levying the tax.



With the Fall Season upon us, the Zoning Department has begun receiving phone calls regarding leaves. Please be advised that **there are NO zoning regulations regarding leaves and/or leaf clean up.** The Township provides a yard waste recycling drop-off site. If you know of an elderly person or a neighbor needing assistance, lend a helping hand. House Bill (HB) 140 made significant changes to ballot language for voted property tax levies starting with the May 2023 election and thereafter. The primary changes it makes are as follows:

- Requires most ballot language to include the estimated total amount the levy would collect annually, which previously was only required for certain fixed-sum levies; and
- Requires ballot language to convey a levy's cost in dollars for each \$100,000 of the county auditor's appraised value meaning the full market value. Previously the cost for a tax levy was stated in dollars and cents for each \$100 of taxable (assessed) value, which is 35% of the appraised value for real property.

The Stark County Board of Elections' website permits you to view your ballot for your precinct days prior to early voting commencing. Go to www.starkcounty.gov/government/offices/ board_of_elections, and click on the "Show Me My Ballot" tab.

Are you doing all you can to prevent a fire in your home?

Cooking is the leading cause of house fires.

- Never leave cooking unattended.
- Always have a lid readily available to
- cover your pan in the event a fire occurs. Keep anything that can catch fire away
- from the stovetop. Double check appliances are turned off when you finish.
- Prevent fires by keeping your oven and stovetop clean of grease and dust.
- Never use water on a grease fire

- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned

Electrical fires cause on average 32,160 house fires each year.

- Keep wires away from hot surfaces.

- **Test** smoke alarms monthly. Push the test button on the unit to make sure the alarm sounds.
- Clean your alarm at least once a year. Vacuum out any dust and cobwebs that may have accumulated.
 - <u>Never</u> disable the smoke alarm.

Replace any smoke alarm that is older than 10 years. That is the service life of the smoke alarm.



Dear Friends,

Once again we find ourselves wrapping up another eventful summer in Stark County. Another successful Pro Football Hall of Fame Festival is completed and the Stark County Fair is likely at or near completion as you are reading this. The biggest reminder that the end of summer has arrived is the start of a new school year. Plain Local Schools students returned to the classroom on August 22, 2023. With the start of school, there are a number of things that my office is working on to prepare for it from a law enforcement perspective.

The Stark County Sheriff's Office works with school districts to ensure safe routes to school. We work with the schools, parents and local communities to make the trip to and from school as safe as possible. Our deputies will be conducting extra enforcement of school zone speed limits. We will be closely monitoring school bus traffic to ensure that people stop when the red lights are flashing on those buses. I urge everyone to pay very close attention to school buses and watch for them stopping or for any children who may suddenly appear in the road to enter or exit a bus. It only takes a split second for tragedy to strike, especially if you are driving distracted.

The Stark County Sheriff's Office has a number of school resource officers, also known as SROs, stationed throughout the Plain Local School District. These deputies have received specialized training to protect and defend your children while also fostering positive relationships with law enforcement. These SROs

spend their summer doing ongoing training and education to prepare for the return to school. The collaboration and sharing of resource between the Stark County Sheriff's Office, Plain Local School and Plain Township is invaluable in helping protect the safety of the children in this community.


As school gets moving full steam ahead, it is also a good time to talk with your child about cybersecurity and online safety. There is a good chance they will be working more on the computer to get school work completed. Remind them to be cautious while working online. Instruct them not to share personal information with unknown people. You should closely monitor what your child is doing online and the sites they are visiting. Talk with your child about online safety to help them feel comfortable and make sure they know that they can come to you with any problems. Make sure your child is aware of the dangers of cyber bullying and other inappropriate activity. Let them know that all bullying and requests for inappropriate information or photos should be immediately reported to you. Please help your child feel comfortable coming to you when they have a problem and are uncertain of how to handle it. Know that our SROs are always available to help guide and keep your child safe. Encourage your children that they can always go to their SRO for help throughout the day!







When to stop for a school bus in Ohio

On a road with fewer than four lanes, all traffic approaching a stopped school bus from either direction must stop at least 10 feet from the front or rear of the bus and remain stopped until the bus begins to move or the bus driver signals motorists to proceed.



If the bus is stopped on a street with four or more lanes, only traffic proceeding in the same direction as the bus must stop.

Failure to stop for a school bus adds 2 points to your license in Ohio and is punishable by fines up to \$500. You must appear in court and the judge has the discretion to suspend your driver's license for up to one year. A driver who injures a pedestrian while failing to comply with school bus safety laws can face both criminal charges and civil liability. Those liabilities can include the victim's medical expenses, lost wages, rehabilitation, and non-economic damages, such as pain and suffering.

2023 Paving & Road Repair Project

The 2023 resurfacing contract of \$1,860,117.00 is now completed on 10 miles of aging roadway. All streets are carefully graded each fall by the LTAP Pavement Condition Rating Software System to assure our residents a continuous, smooth, and safe roadway. We would like to thank our residents for their patience with any inconvenience that may have occurred during this time.

Our Plain Township Road Crew replaced over 1,500 feet of deteriorated concrete curb and gutter on various streets.

Over 50 miles of striping on Township roadways has been completed at a contracted price of \$45,552.70. The annual striping also includes all school zones, crosswalks, stop bars, and railroad crossings. This is done on an annual basis as this helps assist safe driving during both day and night.



Storm water systems are designed to accept only rain and snow runoff. Chlorinated water can be toxic to fish and other aquatic plants and organisms. Swimming pool water must be de-chlorinated before discharging into storm water system.

To properly de-chlorinate pool water, stop adding chlorine to uncovered pool and wait a minimum of 48 hours. Sunlight dissipates chlorine within a couple of days. You can also add sodium thiosulphate, which can be obtained at most pool stores. Monitor chlorine levels with a swimming pool test kit. When the chlorine is no longer detected, it is safe to discharge the water. Allow water to flow over a grassy area, slowly, to filter as much as possible.

Road Department PERMITS & FORMS

Permits and forms can be obtained and paid for on the Township website by scanning the QR code above. Our staff works jointly with contractors and residents on driveway and right-of-way permits to ensure quality and restoration are completed accurately.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Plain Township Road Department is responsible for 175.215 miles of roadway.
- We have 12 dedicated drivers that maintain the snow removal in all of Plain Township.
- Plain Township Road Department sweeps over 350 lane miles throughout the year.
- Plain Township Road Department maintains over 7,000 signs which include stop signs, street signs, speed limit signs, no parking signs, etc.
- Plain Township Road Department maintains over 95 miles of concrete curb and gutter.
- Plain Township Road Department manages yard waste operations and disposal.
- Plain Township Road Department has a culvert inspection camera that allows us to see where culverts are collapsed or failing.
- You can call the Plain Township Road Department to clean out your catch basins and storm sewer lines at the roadway.



Speed Trailer Requests

The Plain Township Speed Trailer is available for use in neighborhoods, school zones, construction sites, and on roads where the speeding of vehicles may be a problem. This unit is a portable, selfcontained speed display device that is towed to sites experiencing speed-related problems. A specially designed radar is mounted inside the locked trailer, recording speeds. Motorists see their speeds displayed on a highly visible lighted display. The speed limit sign above the display reminds motorist to pay attention and obey the posted speed limit.

An onboard computer collects information pertaining to date, time and speed of each vehicle that passes. The information is downloaded by the Road Department, and reports are given to the Plain Township Sheriff. They then can appropriately dispatch deputies on the specific day and time to enforce speed limits. **Please call the Road Department at 330-492-3423 to schedule.**

(NPDES) permit and relevant ordinances.

It is permitted to discharge on private property as long as it stays on that property and does not drain into neighboring yards causing a nuisance issue with neighbors. (Flooding a neighbor's yard with discharge).

DE-CHLORINATED POOL WATER:

This can be permitted to be discharged into the nearest storm water system based on Plain Township's NPDES permit. If unsure of local ordinances, check with the zoning office prior to discharging pool water.

SALT POOL WATER:

Not permitted to be discharged into the storm water system per Plain Township's NPDES. Water can be discharged on your lawn but will also cause salt accumulations. This will lead to soil infertility and an unsightly, patchy lawn. Water should be discharged into a sanitary sewer system or disposed by a licensed contractor.

Right-of-Way Obstructions

A friendly reminder as winter approaches:

Trash cans and portable or permanent basketball hoops cannot be placed in the road right-of-way, according to ORC Section 3767.15.



ONLY RAIN DOWN THE DRAIN!

Please remember not to rake leaves, grass clippings, or other debris into storm sewers, ditches, or streets. Keeping our storm sewers and ditches clean reduces drainage problems. Please note that it is illegal to dump oil, antifreeze, herbicides, pesticides or other hazardous products into ditches, culverts or catch basins.

If you see dumping taking place, please report it to the Stark County Health Department at 330-493-9904.

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Nixle Emergency Notifications

The Plain Township Board of Trustees has a community notification service available to all residents, businesses, schools and organizations within Plain Township. This service is called "Nixle." It is a way for our Sheriff's Office, Road, Fire and Parks Departments to communicate quickly and effectively to our residents in case of a township emergency or event. The Nixle service lets us reach out to residents to inform them of events like road closures, snow bans, amber alerts, severe weather, and township wide events (just to name a few) by using email, texting or voice messaging.
